### How often do you phone in sick when you're well? The results of a new study show:

- The average person takes eight days a year off sick. People who work in the
  public sector, for example education, take more time off than other people.
  The highest figure is in the police force. The average worker in the police force
  takes 12 days sick leave a year.

   40% of days off result from flu.
